WELCOME

Dear Parishioners and Friends,

Greetings to you all!

27th Sunday in Ordinary Time: Year B

The liturgy of the Word today clearly expresses the intention of God that those who are united in the bond of marriage should live together and it should be permanent.

In the first reading today, we see how God created every living creature in the world. The creation of God beautifully sings the glory of God. God gave the great privilege to the man whom he created to name his creation, and whatever he named, that became their name, what a privilege. When God found that there was no suitable helpmate for him, God created his helpmate. Our Lord says that it is not good that the man should be alone. I will make him a helpmate. This passage serves as how God first initiated the sacrament of marriage.

The intention of God is seen in Genesis 2:23-24, when he created Adam and Eve, that the two people who marry should become so indissolubly one that they are one flesh. They were created for each other. They are the pattern and symbol for all who were to come.

In the Gospel Jesus explains that Moses permitted divorce as a *concession* in view of a lost ideal. But Jesus sets the high ideal of the married life before those who are willing to accept his commands. Jesus, likewise, also sets the high ideal for those who freely renounce marriage for the sake of the kingdom of heaven (Matthew 19:11-12). Both marriage and celibacy are calls from God to live a consecrated life, that is to live as married couples or as singles who belong not to themselves but to God. Our lives are not our own, but they belong to God. He gives the grace and power to those who seek to follow his way of holiness in their state of life. Do you seek the Lord and his grace in your state of life?

In my second year of Priesthood, I was invited to officiate at a 50th wedding anniversary Mass in India. I did not preach but I invited them to share about their secret of married life. The couple shared saying, we worked on the grace of God we received through this sacrament of marriage, every day and that is the secret of our marriage.

Yes, we all need to work on the graces that we receive from each sacrament, when we work on that God will give us the strength to continue the journey we have chosen. Let us pray for all married couples that they continue to strengthen their union through prayer and support for one another. Also pray for those who are contemplating married life and for those who are single that in every state of life we always fulfil the intention of God. Amen



Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.
