Dear Parishioners and Friends,

Greetings to you all!

We continue our reflection on the Sermon on the plain from the Gospel of Luke, which we started listening to two Sundays ago with the Beatitudes. Jesus' words as usual are very sharp and straightforward.

Jesus mentions another interesting metaphor the- tree and its fruits. "There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'

Just like a tree producing fruit that reflects its state of health or disease, a good man draws from the store of goodness in his heart, a bad man draws from his store of badness. Jesus concludes the teaching by reminding the disciple that speech is a mirror of the soul: "From the fulness of the heart the mouth speaks" (Lk 6:45). In other words, today's gospel invites us all to a life of honesty and integrity.

The Church has given this reading for us today to look into our lives and find out where I really need to correct my life and be a good Christian. Sometime or other we are all guilty of rash judgements and unjustified criticisms to a greater or lesser degree. Let us turn this criticism on ourselves rather and judge ourselves honestly so that we shall worthily live our Christian vocation and be Christlike. We cannot become saints in a week or a month but little by little, slowly, and steadily we all can do so.

Christ's message is always straightforward and calls us to action. So let us spend time with ourselves and find out how we can live the beatitudes in our lives and be good Christians to our brothers and sisters. Also do not be afraid to ask pardon from those we have wrongly judged in our lives. Amen.
