Dear Parishioners and Friends,

Greetings to you all!

These days you will hear people saying; there are so many in need in our own country and cities. There are so many reasons why we should not be sending money overseas. We should be helping our own. Despite the fact that we have so many opportunities to remedy these situations, we have not. Maybe it is only by looking at a much bigger picture that we can develop a new way of seeing the real resolution to local and global problems. Has this generation really become so introverted?

Jesus, quoting the Book of Deuteronomy taught, 'Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind'; and, 'Love your neighbour as yourself.' But when Jesus was asked, "Who is my neighbour?" he did not give the standard expected answer, explicitly; relatives and people from around our own village. Jesus does not quarrel with the fact that one should look after one's own kin but at the same time, he extends the notion of kin or family to include a much wider field.

In the parable of the Good Samaritan, he cites the mishap of a mysterious 'traveller'. He then asks "Who is a neighbour to this man?" The 'neighbour' was not to be found in the self-righteous nor was the example of neighbourly love to be found in the legalistic person. The hero of the story is one who can sympathize. In the parable, it is a Samaritan.

The Samaritan is one who is travelling along the same road. One who is also vulnerable to the same capricious misfortunes. One who is despised and rejected by the very people who were listening to the parable. What make this Samaritan 'Good' is that fact that he did not consider his own situation but allowed himself to be moved with compassion.

When faced with many of the world's needs it is tempting to say that we are helpless. We have to protect our own. So why should be even begin to try?

The origin of Catholic Mission

An example of love for God and neighbour was <u>Pauline Marie Jaricot</u>. Born on 22 July 1799 into a family of rich Lyon silk merchants. After hearing a Lenten homily against worldly vanities, the then 17-year-old experienced a radical conversion, and began to visit and take care of the poor.

In 1820, Pauline received a letter from her brother Phileas, a student at the Seminary of St. Sulpice, in which he explained the needs of the members of the Paris Foreign Missions Society. Pauline gathered the workers in her father's factory into groups of ten to donate a sou (a penny/cent) to support the foreign missions. Each participant would then recruit another "ten". The "tens" become "hundreds" and eventually gathered momentum beyond Lyon.

The Society was formally approved in 1822.

When we are faced with a need no matter how great it is, the one principle to keep in mind is that <u>love</u> and <u>generosity</u> do not arise from with us. They are rather, qualities of God, which he shares with us in order that we take part in filling the world with these qualities.

If we restrict love or generosity is any way, they cease to be.

If we give free reign to love then it becomes the action of God in the world. As imperfect and seemingly futile as our efforts may seem it be, every effort becomes God touching hearts and renewing the world from within.

No action done with love, no gift, given from a generous heart is ever too small, because Jesus once took two loaves and two fish and with that little offering, he fed a multitude of people. And when all the people were fed there was more than enough.
