Dear Parishioners and Friends, Greetings to you all!

The readings for this Sunday liturgy invite us to reflect upon the virtue of gratitude. When I thank others, I become aware of God's presence in my life through them. At the end of the day if one could look back into their lives, I am sure one will be able to point out how many times God walked into their lives through others. Also, it is true that when I am thankful, I become aware that what I have received that day is purely a gift from God and not something that others owe to my life.

Today's first reading and the gospel text have extraordinary similarities. Both are stories about lepers, who were healed; in both stories there are expressions of gratitude; and both are about outsiders!

Out of the many healing miracles of Jesus mentioned in the four gospels, this is the only miracle that mentions, a healed person returns to thank Jesus. Other healing miracles provide information that the healed person praised God and spread the name of Jesus. This is the only miracle which mentions the thankful attitude of a healed Samaritan leper and Naaman, who was the commander of the army of the king of Aram. He was a great man and was in high favour with his master because by him the Lord had given victory to Aram.

Sometimes in our conversation with others we might have heard about the ingratitude of the others and how it brought pain in their lives. I believe that thanking others should be part of our Christian life, especially when I receive some help from others though the other did it as part of their work or ministry.

When I was ordained to the Priesthood, I informed my mother to welcome especially my primary school teachers along with other guests, because I wanted to thank them for the foundation they have laid in my life. Some of the teachers could make it for my ordination; among them most were Hindus, and it was their first time to witness such an event in their lives. Though I still cherish their presence for the occasion of my ordination and for their guidance in my life, I still cannot forget the telegrammed message I received from my Head Mistress, who told me; "John thanks for the invitation, I never expected it, but thank you; and I only did my job." My Headmistress did not expect the thanks from me, but I wanted to thank her because of what I have received through her guidance in my life.

Friends, this is my little story. What is your story in life? Do you take time to thank God and others in your life? Amen.

The Oblate Story in Australia

Dear parishioners and friends of the Oblates,

It is one of my aims to give you some knowledge about who the Oblates are, in Australia and around the Oblate world. First, I would like to begin with the "Oblates story in Australia". Over the next few weeks, I will share with you the article written by Fr. Austin Cooper OMI.

Hope you enjoy this new initiative in our weekly bulletin.

Introduction:

Charles Joseph Eugene De Mazenod, who founded the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate, OMI, was born in 1782 in Southern France. Although his family was wealthy, they were forced to flee France during the French revolution, leaving all their possessions behind. It was 1790 and Eugene was just 8 years old.

Eugene's father had been a politician but was forced to become a tradesman in Italy, making it difficult for Eugene to have a good education other than that provided by a Priest in Venice.

Eugene returned to France in 1802 when he was 20 and saw that the Catholic Church in his native country had suffered a great deal during the Revolution. The education he had received in Italy had included religious instruction and Eugene was drawn to the beauty of the religious life he had witnessed in Venice.

Assisted by a mystical experience, he entered a Seminary in Paris and was ordained a Priest in 1811, aged 29. Rather than work in a Parish, Eugene worked among the poor and vulnerable and in 1826 received approval from Pope Leo XII to found a new religious Order. Thus, was born the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate (OMI). to be continued...
