Dear Parishioners and Friends, Greetings to you all!

The kernel of God's desire to deliver the people of Israel from their slavery in Egypt becomes clear in the call of Moses. God (Yahweh) was very much aware of their present situation, so he wanted his servant Moses to go and be part of his salvific plan. God addressed Moses saying, "The cry of the Israelites has now come to me; I have also seen how the Egyptians oppress them. So come, I will send you to Pharaoh to bring my people, the Israelites, out of Egypt" (Exo: 3: 9-10).

As they were on their journey towards the Promised Land, they experienced thirst, which is indeed a human need especially when you are on a long journey and that too in a desert area. When the people of Israel experienced their need to quench their thirst, they immediately complained saying: 'Why did you bring us out of Egypt?' they said. 'Was it so that I should die of thirst, my children too, and my cattle?'. This complaint shows how quick they were to forget the marvellous encounter of God they had so far and how quick they were to doubt the presence of God in their journey. All the past favours, all the days of good health and prosperity, are immediately forgotten, because these past benefits were rarely or never attributed to God with any real sincerity. The people of Israel failed to understand the presence of God in their journey toward the Promised Land, and thus they were short of understanding God's love and his plan.

Now, Moses had to face these present issues with the people, who were together on the journey towards the Promised Land. So, he approaches God saying, "How am I to deal with this people?" he said. 'A little more and they will stone me!' I am sure, when you and I face issues in life, we would have raised more questions as Moses did in the desert.

The leadership qualities of Moses give us more motivations and guidelines, as what one should do, during the moments of crisis. Moses turned immediately to God and wanted his assistance and presence to deal with the situations of his life. He did it because he knew God would help him to face situations in life. In other words, he trusted in God, which the people of Israel failed to do. So, when faced with difficulties let us be firm in our faith, hope and trust in God.

Thomas Merton says, "You do not need to know precisely what is happening, or exactly where it is all going. What you need is to recognize the possibilities and challenges offered by the present moment, and to embrace them with courage, faith, and hope." Amen.

A spring of water welling up to eternal life

Jesus came to the Samaritan town called Sychar, near the land that Jacob gave to his son Joseph. Jacob's well is there and Jesus, tired by the journey, sat straight down by the well. It was about the sixth hour. When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, 'Give me a drink.' His disciples had gone into the town to buy food. The Samaritan woman said to him, 'What? You are a Jew and you ask me, a Samaritan, for a drink?' – Jews, in fact, do not associate with Samaritans. Jesus replied:

'If you only knew what God is offering and who it is that is saying to you: Give me a drink, you would have been the one to ask, and he would have given you living water.'

'You have no bucket, sir,' she answered 'and the well is deep: how could you get this living water? Are you a greater man than our father Jacob who gave us this well and drank from it himself with his sons and his cattle?' Jesus replied:

'Whoever drinks this water will get thirsty again; but anyone who drinks the water that I shall give will never be thirsty again: the water that I shall give will turn into a spring inside him, welling up to eternal life.'

'Sir,' said the woman 'give me some of that water, so that I may never get thirsty and never have to come here again to draw water. I see you are a prophet, sir. Our fathers worshipped on this mountain, while you say that Jerusalem is the place where one ought to worship.'

Jesus said:

'Believe me, woman,
the hour is coming
when you will worship the Father
neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem.
You worship what you do not know;
we worship what we do know:
for salvation comes from the Jews.
But the hour will come

- in fact it is here already -

when true worshippers will worship the Father in spirit and truth:

that is the kind of worshipper the Father wants.

God is spirit,

and those who worship

must worship in spirit and truth.'

The woman said to him, 'I know that Messiah – that is, Christ – is coming; and when he comes he will tell us everything.' 'I who am speaking to you,' said Jesus 'I am he.'

Many Samaritans of that town had believed in him on the strength of the woman's testimony when she said, 'He told me all I have ever done', so, when the Samaritans came up to him, they begged him to stay with them. He stayed for two days, and when he spoke to them many more came to believe; and they said to the woman, 'Now we no longer believe because of what you told us; we have heard him ourselves and we know that he really is the saviour of the world.'
