From time to time, we all experience fears, worries, and anxieties. Because we are prone to fear, anxiety, and worry, it is no wonder that several hundred times the Bible advises us not to worry. Why does the Bible keep telling us not to worry? Because our faith is weak and instead of looking at God, too often we look at the problems. If we prayed more, I'm sure we would see God sending us help from somewhere. If we try to live without Jesus, life will not go nearly as well as when we have Jesus at the centre of our lives. We can overcome problems better with Jesus in our lives than without Jesus. If we turn our backs on Jesus, how can we expect to succeed? Focus on Jesus and not on the problems. When we have problems, turn to Jesus who is always waiting for us.

In the Gospel today, Jesus teaches His disciples, assuring them that He will prepare a place for them in His Father's house and declaring Himself as the way, the truth, and the life. He also tells them that those who believe in Him will do greater works than He has done and promises to send them the Holy Spirit to guide them.

The first reading takes us back into the early days of the Church when a problem seems to have arisen. Back in those days the Government did not look out for widows and orphans or other needy people. It seems already some provision had been made to take care of widows, but in this case, it was only for those who were of Jewish descent. Converts from Greek speaking people were being neglected. This caused a problem and was brought to the attention of the Apostles. Certainly, under Divine inspiration they instituted the order of the Diaconate to help in this matter. The Church has always referred to this passage as a Scriptural basis and proof of the establishment of the diaconate as part of Sacred Orders. Today would be a good day to thank all those who work quietly behind the scenes so that our lives are comfortable.

The second reading taken from the first Letter of Peter introduces a new metaphor – living stones. The verses invite the Christians to come to Jesus the living stone. By coming to him who is rejected by the mortals, the Christians themselves become like stones and they can let themselves be built into a spiritual household. By participating and sharing in the life of Jesus, the Church becomes a new household. In this way, the Christians also become a corporate body of priests forming a holy priesthood offering their lives of faith and love to God as spiritual sacrifices. The Christians as the chosen people using four titles of Israel from the Old Testament namely a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation and God's own people. These titles indicate the unique dignity of the Christians. May God give us the grace to recognise and cherish our gifts and talents and use them to reveal God in and through our lives. God Bless Fr.
