Dear Parishioners and Friends,

Holy Thursday marks the end of the season of Lent and beginning of the Easter Triduum. Today we remember and celebrate three gifts that Jesus instituted and gave us on this special Day: the Institution of the Holy Eucharist, the institution of the Priesthood and the new commandment of fraternal charity. Indeed, Holy Thursday is one of our holiest days. It draws our attention to ponder on God's gift of undeserved, unconditional, and unifying love.

During the Last Supper, Jesus demonstrates this love. The Gospel says he rises from the table, takes a towel, and ties it around his waist (In 13:4). He then begins to wash the feet of his disciples, one by one. We know that Jesus humbled himself to share in our humanity, but in the washing of the feet, Jesus acts more intimate and self-humbling than ever before; an act far more significant than a simple show of kindness.

It is at this supper, in the presence of his closest companions, that Jesus offers himself as the Passover sacrifice. "This is my body that is for you. Do this in remembrance of me... This cup is the new covenant in my blood. Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me" (1 Cor 11:24-25). Jesus gives his greatest gift in the sacrament of the Eucharist, a gift that makes us sharers in his body and blood, unified to form one single body.

The grace of Holy Thursday is knowing that God embraces us despite our weaknesses and imperfections. This is a lesson we need to learn in a personal way, but the reminder is a constant consolation in this work to end the death penalty. God meets our frailty with love, without judgement or exclusion. God's love is given to us without distinction. "I have given you a model to follow, so that as I have done for you, you should also do (Jn 13:15)."

On this first day of the Triduum, we recognize God's unfailing gift of undeserved, unconditional, and unifying love for us. This love has the power to embolden every human heart and calls us to do the same. Let us ask for the grace to respond to God's call to love one another accordingly. As Jesus said, he has set us an example and it is our turn to imitate him and his love by loving and serving our brothers and sisters who are in need of our love and support.

Pope Saint John Paul II writing to the priest for Holy Thursday in 2004 said: We were born from the Eucharist. If we can truly say that the whole Church lives from the Eucharist ("Ecclesia de Eucharistia vivit"), as I reaffirmed in my recent Encyclical, we can say the same thing about the ministerial priesthood: it is born, lives, works and bears fruit Eucharistia". "There can be no Eucharist without the priesthood, just as there can be no priesthood without the Eucharist". The ordained ministry, which may never be reduced to its merely functional aspect since it belongs on the level of "being", enables the priest to act in persona Christi and culminates in the moment when he consecrates the bread and wine, repeating the actions and words of Jesus during the Last Supper.

As we, on this special and holy day, remember the institution of the priesthood by Jesus, let us thank God for our priests, and the priest all over the world who are serving God and His people under difficult and trying circumstances. We pray that God may protect our priest and give more workers to the church to work in his vineyard. May God bless you all.

# The Liturgy of the Word

# First Reading

A reading from the book of Exodus 12:1-8,11-14

The Passover is a day of festival for all generations, for ever

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: 'This month is to be the first of all the others for you, the first month of your year. Speak to the whole community of Israel and say, "On the tenth day of this month each man must take an animal from the flock, one for each family: one animal for each household. If the household is too small to eat the animal, a man must join with his neighbour, the nearest to his house, as the number of persons requires. You must take into account what each can eat in deciding the number for the animal. It must be an animal without blemish, a male one year old; you may take it from either sheep or goats. You must keep it till the fourteenth day of the month when the whole assembly of the community of Israel shall slaughter it between the two evenings. Some of the blood must then be taken and put on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses where it is eaten. That night, the flesh is to be eaten, roasted over the fire; it must be eaten with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. You shall eat it like this: with a girdle round your waist, sandals on your feet, a staff in your hand. You shall eat it hastily: it is a passover in honour of the Lord. That night, I will go through the land of Egypt and strike down all the first-born in the land of Egypt, man and beast alike, and I shall deal out punishment to all the gods of Egypt, I am the Lord! The blood shall serve to mark the houses that you live in. When I see the blood I will pass over you and you shall escape the destroying plague when I strike the land of Egypt. This day is to be a day of remembrance for you, and you must celebrate it as a feast in the Lord's honour. For all generations you are to declare it a day of festival, for ever."
